### SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. 2. Flat walking, road or track
- Road or track, gentle hills
- 3. Track, some hilly sections
- 4. 5. Track, some steep sections
- Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required.

# **Pre-outing Reports**

Sunday the 21st October. North Girraween Fence; led by Carol Smallwood.

Meet at Weeroona Park at 9am to travel to the Pyramids Road section in Girraween NP. This walk starts from Pyramids Road, on the section that has been surfaced south of Parrish Lane, and goes to the west on a track closed to vehicles. Crossing over over the small creek in a Banksia patch it ascends rapidly to a group of rocks on one of which is a lyre-bird's nest. Once through the rocks the path picks up a trail which ascends again until it flattens out alongside the northern boundary fence of the Park. Once on the northern boundary fence the walk is relatively level and the woodland is open with stands of several tree species. There are several places where a short walk to the south brings magnificent views to the south on rock sheets and outcrops overlooking the Park. How far one goes along the fence line can be decided depending how far the group gets on the day.

There is limited space to park safely on the road as it is steep and cambered so, depending on the number of vehicles, it may be necessary to park some vehicles in the Dr Roberts Waterhole car park and ferry back to the start.

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# **OUTING REPORTS**

Friday 7th September: Wylie Creek, Liston, NSW

Eight people took the opportunity to attend the outing on Friday 7th September. We drove out to Liston then down the Rivertree Road to the property which is bordered by Wylie Creek. Morning tea was had at the cars before walking down to the creek where we inspected a steam engine left behind from the tin mining days, a long way from Cincinnati, Ohio, where it was built. The creek, with its large mining dredge holes was popular with birdlife, and we were able to watch the antics of a trio of Striated Pardelotes as they flitted in and out of a hole high up in the trunk of a eucalypt tree. We made



our way along the creek bank then scrambled up to follow the fence along the northern side of the property, taking care to step around a couple of deep mine shafts. A small tree growing in a trench

near here was, sadly, a young Camphor Laurel but it was good to see two healthy Tree ferns growing nearby.



Leaving the fence line we made our way through the remnant eucalypt forest where many trees were adorned with vines, mostly Monkey Vine *Parsonia straminea*, but also Headache Vine *Clematis glycinoides*, which one member demonstrated its use to clear the sinuses by sniffing the crushed leaves – but beware the serious burning effect on the skin.

We returned to the cars and made our separate way home with two members electing to travel on to have lunch at the Undercliffe Falls.

Plant list – Acacia floribunda, Caladenia, Tree Fern Cyathea australis, Camphor Laurel Cinnamomum camphora, Beard heath Leucopogon lanceolatus, Sarsaparilla Hardenbergia violacea, Monkey Vine Parsonia straminea, Wonga Wonga Vine Pandorea pandorana, Headache Vine Clematis glycinoides, Twining glycine Glycine clandestina, Mountain violet Viola betonicifolia, Caladinia carnea.

Some of these plants were not in flower but I thought it was interesting to note them and that there were five different vines.

Butterfly: One brown butterfly was seen and caught as it would not rest long enough for a photo. It turned out to be a Forest Brown, *Argynnina cyrila* which is shown as occurring in northern NSW at the edge of its range and not recorded from Queensland.

Bird List – Firetail finch, Superb blue wren, Australian grebe, Striated pardelote, Yellow robin, White-throated gerygone, Grey fantail, Crimson rosella.

# Mt Norman Through-walk September 23rd 2012




We don't often have outing days when the weather is just right, but this was one of them and 17 people turned up to make the most of it. After the usual meet-up at Weeroona Park we drove to the Girraween NP and left two vehicles at the Castle Rock camping area, which was filled to capacity with campers, then travelled on to have morning tea at the Mt. Norman Day-use area.

The 30 odd mm of rain during the week before the outing freshened up the bush, though it came too late for some plants, and in spite of the previous dry spell we were

greeted with quite a display of wild flowers. The *Boronia* and pea flowers at the base of Mt. Norman put on a wonderful show. We spent a little time contemplating the geological origin of the Eye of the Needle before continuing along the track, past a large swathe of *Pomaderris* and then stopping for lunch with a view down to Castle Rock and the Pyramids.

A little further down the track we were grateful to another group of walkers who pointed out an Echidna which had ambled across the track in front of them and was seen huddled against a rock in a typically defensive manner. Upon reaching the Castle Rock camping area again the two cars left there were used to take the drivers back to retrieve their vehicles and return to the Girraween Day-use area for afternoon tea, some of which was shared with a rather bad mannered Kookaburra, which stole the cake from my hand as I was raising it to my mouth!
