- 1. Flat walking, road or track
- 2. Road or track, gentle hills
- 3. Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country steep sections with scrambles over rocks etc., and some thick undergrowth.
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, high level of fitness

Australian Naturalists Network 2014 Get-together

Here is an opportunity to meet like-minded naturalists from around Australia and double up with a holiday in Tasmania. But you need to plan now.

The Australian Naturalists Network 2014 get-together based at The Lea Scout Centre is being hosted by the Tasmanian Field Naturalists Club. It will run from 17th to 24th October, 2014. The Lea Scout Centre is a 10-minute drive from the centre of Hobart. The Hobart Bush Cabins on site are booked out, but there are other accommodation options available at the Centre, including camping and bunk huts. Meals are provided (continental breakfast, cut lunch or BBQ and catered dinner) as part of the cost, which will be finalised in early 2014.

The program consists of daily excursions such as Tahune Airwalk/Arve Valley, Chauncy Vale Wildlife Sanctuary, which offers a number of bush walks, and the Tasman Peninsula. Evening guest speakers will be covering a number of topics e.g. orchids, furry things, and Tasmanian snails, jellyfish and bats.

Pre-outing Reports

Saturday 8th February – Northern Boundary Girraween N.P.

An exploratory walk along the northern boundary of Girraween following the fence line for several kilometres and then heading south west to ascend to a rocky outcrop close to Slip Rock. We will be following the fire trail along the fence line and then walking up to a kilometre "cross country" to climb the rock outcrops towards Slip Rock. It will be up to the group as to how far we explore this area as I have only gone as far as the first ridge on a previous explorative walk. The walk is graded 7 to 8. Bring plenty of water as there is no water available en route.

We will meet at 9 am Weeroona Park and 9.20 at the Parrish Lane / Eukey Road turnoff for those members not wishing to drive into Stanthorpe. This will be an all-day walk so bring morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea. Leech protection may be necessary at this time of the year as well as sunscreen and hats. Long pants are recommended. *Leader – Carol Smallwood*

This will be the second outing for 2014 and we are off to Tooloom National park which is approximately 70 km from Stanthorpe via Liston and Legume.

A feature of the day will be a giant stinging tree with a circumference measured in men! Twelve men can stand around the trunk of this tree; I will leave that to your imagination, but I think one will need to be there to find out how big this actually is.

This will be another great chance to catch up with fellow club members and visitors alike on what should be an interesting and enjoyable day.

Outing Reports

Saturday 2nd November – Roundhouse near Mt Norman

A total of sixteen people attended the outing. We drove to the Mt Norman parking area via Bald Mountain Road, and stopped briefly at the railway overpass bridge with its views to the prominent granite peaks overlooking Wallangarra. We made use of the tables, and toilet, at the parking area where we had morning tea, and found quite a few flowering plants, including two orchids.

We continued along the road with its remarkable display of wildflowers, although not as good as on the pre-outing, with masses of *Boronia*, *Dillwinia* and *Conospermum*. The latter, *C.burgessiorum* is on the Rare plants list and is a very showy plant with red stems, long green leaves and masses of white flowers on the top of the stems. Col was able to show us a spot where it seems this plant has made a natural hybrid with the smaller species, *C.taxifolium* which has very small leaves, to create a plant with medium length leaves. All three species were flowering quite near to each other.

After parking off the road we set off to the Roundhouse along a disused road which soon became so overgrown we had to make our way through the bush. The two story house of stone was built about 40 years ago but was only occupied for a few years before the land became part of the National Park in 1979. While we were there, a Superb lyrebird could be heard calling quite close to us.

The return trip to the cars was via a different track and after we had lunch in the shade, we set off to climb the nearby granite tor to the east. This was an easy walk with good views to Mt Norman, Twin Peaks and Billy Goat hill while the valley of Racecourse Creek in the foreground had a substantial waterhole which looked inviting in the heat of the afternoon.

An exciting find here was a Flying duck orchid *Caleana major* growing in a very exposed spot in some leaf litter. We returned to the cars and headed home, some deciding to continue along Mt Norman Road to Girraween.

Sunday 24th November 2013 - Warroo

After meeting at Weeroona Park as usual at 9.00am we drove out to the Warroo orchard via the Stanthorpe Inglewood Road and Soldiers Settlement Road. Our host Bim Goodrich was waiting for us and opened the amenities block at the shed for our convenience. While we enjoyed morning tea on the verandah, with views to Mt Bullaganang, Bim outlined the operation of the orchard to us. The Queen Garnet plum was developed at the Applethorpe Research Centre and has such a high antioxidant content it will be processed as a health supplement when the orchard is in full production. After a look at the trees, which had a nice crop of fruit although only three years old, we moved on to the Warroo Gold mine.

Water which came into the hole left from the mining venture was one of the reasons the orchard was started, but unfortunately didn't supply the volume required so other sources have been found. The gold bearing material removed from the mine was crushed and put in a pile on a plastic waterproof membrane, and then a cyanide solution was sprayed on top. The gold was leached out into a collection pond where it was recovered from the solution. Bim took us up on top of the leaching pile where we could readily see how the process worked. We also had a good view back to the orchard.

We headed off to our lunch stop and on the way Bim stopped to show us the stand of timber which has been made a conservation area of some



80 acres. The land was originally quite clear before European settlement, in fact one could easily see up and down the creek, but ironically now can only be used for one week a year to shelter sheep in case of emergency, such as a cold wet spell after shearing. Lunch stop was the Bracker Creek crossing on Tin Hut Road and the recent rain had blocked the pipes under the bridge, as usual, so we had a lovely clear waterhole to sit beside and plenty of bird life.

After lunch we drove on to the Warroo homestead and Bim took us a tour of some the property antiquity. The Post Office with slab walls and shingle roof is now safely housed under a shed roof, the old Store where Bim said up to 40 people would be in line waiting to be served and the Blacksmiths shop with the forge and bellows still in place.



Looking around at all the buildings it wasn't hard to imagine the bustling community that must have been here in the early 1900s. Our next stop was the shearing shed where Bim explained the innovative changes he had made to improve the work flow, and then we walked to the cemetery to see the historic grave sites of the early settlers. We thanked Bim for giving us his time and knowledge for a most interesting day then had afternoon tea in the shade near the shearing shed before heading home via "Terrica" on the Cement Mills road.
