SCALE OF DIFFICULTY FOR WALKS ON NATS OUTINGS

- 1. Flat walking, road or track
- 2. Road or track, gentle hills
- 3. Track, some hilly sections
- 4. Track, some steep sections
- 5. Cross country, easy open forest, gentle slopes
- 6. Track, steep sections common, with steps
- 7. Cross country, some hills, some thick undergrowth
- 8. Cross country, steep sections with scrambles over rocks, etc., and some thick undergrowth
- 9. Cross country, steep, hilly, rough, thick undergrowth
- 10. Mountain climbing, hard going, higher level of fitness or plenty of time required

OUTING REPORT FOR SLIP ROCK VIA THE NORTHERN BOUNDARY, GIRRAWEEN N.P. 8th FEBRUARY.

The exploratory walk along the northern boundary of Girraween N.P. to Slip Rock lived up to its title; quite a hard walk over rugged terrain in hot weather conditions. Thirteen members started the walk, leaving the cars on Pyramid Road just inside the Parks northern boundary fence. We followed the fire



trail up a series of steep hills for several kilometres, stopping for a morning tea break on the way, looking north and east with views of Main Range and Bald Rock N.P.

As the temperature increased, four members decided to head back to the cars, while the remaining group headed "cross country" once the fire trail headed north into private property. We walked south east over large areas of slab rock, interspersed with huge granite boulders

and thick

scrub, up towards the top of the ridge line. It was in this area that members found an unidentified plant that aroused their interest and a desire to return later to check it out. We reached the top of the ridge line with the aid of GPS and topographic maps knowing that we were close to

Slip Rock.



A welcome rest and lunch was taken on the ridge line with views

of Bald Rock, Mt Norman and the area around Dr Robert's Waterhole. It was only a short walk after lunch to our destination of one of the highest points in the Park, Slip Rock, at 1168 metres. On such a clear day we were rewarded with views as far north as Dalveen and Passchendaele and west to Ballandean before heading down the rock to the "intrusion" area known as the Roman Road. We returned back to the cars along fairly open areas of slab rock until we reached the fire trail.

Only a few plants were in flower at this time of the year but we did see some interesting fruiting bodies and seed pods on many of the plants. A variety of birds were seen and heard and a swamp wallaby was sighted. Thank you to those members who guided us to our destination using maps and GPS; not an easy walk in summer and the cars were a very welcome sight on our return.

Plant List. Acacia latisepala, Lagenophora stipitata, Trachymene incise (wild turnip), Hibbertia, Isotoma, Pimilea, Pomax, Micromytus, Dipodium variegatum (Hyacinth Orchid), Westringia, Santalum obtusifolium (sandlewood).

Outing Report - Tooloom - 23rd February 2014

Our Tooloom outing on the 23rd February saw our Stanthorpe group get underway at around 8:10am on what turned out to incorporate a driving tour that circumnavigated the Tooloom National Park. We met up with 6 more field naturalists at Legume and were soon heading away from Legume on the Mt Lindesay Road. Farms along the way were growing soy beans, while the pasture was green. It looked as if it had recently grown, probably as a result of recent storms.



We crossed Koreelah Creek and turned right onto Tooloom Road. This was not as I had planned it, and I am sorry that we did

not set foot in Tooloom as it is a place that has for many years fascinated me. As our convoy snaked its way over the mountain pass we were driving through the Gondwana world heritage area. We climbed to around 850 metres before descending. With Tooloom Creek to our right, we arrived at the lovely village of Urbenville. Here the decision was made to drive on to Woodenbong for a cuppa and toilet break

before proceeding to Jim and Fran's.

Only a short drive and we were on Mt Clunie Road. Arriving at Jim and Fran's we were greeted by an amazing display of flowering Grevillea gardens planted by Jim and Fran. Jim and Fran have very good views to Mt Lindesay from their veranda, which was enjoyed by all, but the giant stinging tree beckoned and was most certainly a mission I wanted to complete. After having a look at the cabins further up the hill, we had a short 4WD drive on a damp mountain road to our base camp, one might say.



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We walked up a gentle incline in a rainforest environment which is also a world heritage area noted for its Hoop Pine. The weather was a blessing - not hot and not raining. We were warned about the stinging trees that we would encounter along the way. We passed through an area where the Walking Stick Palm had established itself. The red, edible berries of this palm were in abundance. We crossed the old logging track which is only identifiable by the row of young Hoop Pines that were planted in the middle of the road once logging had ceased. Beside this road a nest was found that

Fran thought could have belonged to the Pitta which inhabited the area. We also saw an angle-headed dragon that obliged us with plenty of time for photos. I had a go at entering the centre of a strangler fig which had not yet closed its webbing.

Small, basalt rocks covered the forest floor indicating we were close to a dormant vent. The beautiful lace of the Stink Horns lit up the damp leaf litter. At last, the extra-large giant stinging tree. This was majestic; if 12 men could have linked around this tree they would also have had to be extra-large men. Our party of more than 20 only occupied one third of the base of this tree.

Back to base camp for lunch and a chat and then we were on our way down an old logging road that was on the property owned by Jim and Fran. We walked back to the veranda when someone saw the time. A late departure, but the end to a successful day. Tooloom will have to wait.
