- 1. Flat, well-formed track, no steps, 5km or less. Clearly signposted. Suitable for wheelchairs with assistance.
- Formed track. May have gentle hills and some steps. Clearly signposted. No experience required
- Formed track, some obstacles, 20km or less.
 May have short steep hills and many steps.
 Some experience recommended.
- Rough Track. May be long and very steep with few directional signs. For experienced bushwalkers.
- 5. Unformed track. Likely to be very rough, very steep and unmarked. For very experienced bushwalkers with specialised skills.



Pre-Outing Report 20 February 2022 - Driving to Goldfields Crossing via Back Roads

When we were planning our program it was decided that the first outing of the year would be a driving outing so that we wouldn't be walking in the heat. Our first outing for 2022 will take us to the west and north west of Stanthorpe. We will basically take a loop from Stanthorpe out into the traprock country and back to Amiens. From there, we will go to the Goldfields crossing of Pikes Creek for lunch. The return journey will take us via Bapaume and the Cannon Creek Road back to Stanthorpe. The trip takes us through a number of different land forms and vegetation.

Overall the trip should be about 130 km, but that is very dependent on road conditions on the day. The trip contains some dirt roads but is planned to be suitable for conventional vehicles. Some of the roads that we had originally planned to use have been damaged with the

recent weather events so we will be avoiding them. We will do a final check a few days before the 20th.

When travelling on the day please adhere to Nats rules and make sure the vehicle behind is still coming. If the vehicle behind stops then we all stop. We would like you to stop whenever you see something interesting so that everybody gets to have a look. You will be given a running sheet with some interesting things to look for. We would also like you to record any bird sightings and flowers you see . Please bring a chair to make it more comfortable for morning tea and lunch.



Break-up – 5th December 2021 – Peter and Lynette Haselgrove's Place

We met at Peter and Lynettes place in the afternoon of 5th December and were struck by the difference from last year when we were in the midst of a drought. The vegetation was very lush and there were a number of different wildflowers in bloom.

Peter and Lynette had the kettle boiling, so after a cuppa we set out on our walk along the road, with many stops to look at flowers and insects. Gunter

stopped to look at a young eucalypt and we saw three caterpillars, a eucalypt beetle and a leaf-hopper all on the same plant. There were bluebells, golden everlastings, *Leucochrysum albicans albicans*, Pimelea, and *Coreopsis*, among other things. Near the boundary there were a couple of lovely specimens of Clematis in seed and an evening primrose that had just opened its petals.

The barbeque was fired up and we all sat around eating our meal and chatting to end a relaxed afternoon and another successful year.

The 'Mallee Ridge' outing was cancelled, due to the weather. During Kris & Margaret's

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pre-outing, they saw 35 different species of wildflowers, mainly flannel flowers. So as not to miss these, a revised outing has been suggested for next Sunday, 28th November, dependent on the weather, details of which Kris will email out.

General Business:

Kris has a laser printer which had been used for printing the Newsletter. As this is not expected to be needed again, there was discussion as to what we should do with it. As it is not worth much, it was agreed that we donate it to a like-minded group.

Following on from the quoll report, Peter reported on another endangered species, the Regent Honeyeater. In the burnt areas of the Hunter Valley, there is a mistletoe planting blitz happening, with volunteers collecting mistletoe fruit, storing the seeds, and with the help of a Grant, Arborists are planting the seeds high in the trees, giving the birds vital food and nesting sources, a benefit far sooner than planting replacement trees.

Presentation:

Guest Speaker Rick Humphries, President of the Granite Belt Sustainable Action Network, explained their mission to work with Councils, local groups and farmers, with some areas of particular reference being a push for regenerative agriculture, additional protected areas in the region, the development of nature-based tourism opportunities, and feral cat control, aiming towards a sustainable environment, and protecting the Granite Belt's biodiversity.

Rob McCosker then showed us some images from the camp-out at Barakula State Forest, that he and Trish, Peter and Lynette recently attended, along with the Qld. Nats.

Gunter gave us a short show of some of his fascinating work with small creatures.
