BIRD LIFE AND ITS ENVIROMENT.

It was a great pity that member numbers were down for Mr.M. Fletchers, presentation, "Bird Life and its Environment". It was an outstanding programme, depicting local species and including some rare local species and unusual visiting birds, recorded pictorially. The quality of the pictures was superb. Many hours of careful observations, combined with technical excellence provided pictures which were not only so beautiful aesthetically, but also depicted very characters icbehavour patterns and attitudes, highly descriptive of each species. ## NEW PUBLICATIONS

Some attractive books for Nats have been published recently and include: -

1. A new addition of Alec Chisholm's, "Land of Wonder" is an anthol -ogy of selected short nature writings in Australia. This new addition by Angus & Robertson publishers is attractively illust-

2. Birds for Reginners' by J. D. Macdonald (Reed. Pub.) is a joy for any degree of interest in pirds and tells of fascinating habit.

3. Native Plants of Qld Vol 1. by Keith Williams has many hundreds of Qld wildflowers illustrated with his beautiful photographs. He could not get a publisher and made a very courageous bid an printed 2,000 copies himself. He had a rewarding win and sold them, and I believe they are now almost collectors items.

4. The Scenic Rim by Tony Groom and Of dreams and Biscoveries by poet Heather Farmer and Steve Parish, are both publications of delight and by poople lodicated to National Parks and Natue.

LEEDS CASTLE BIRD SANCTUARY by Mr. BILL BARKER. Visitors to England, especially if they are interested in birds, would be well advised to put a visit to Leeds Castle, high on their priority list as a place well worth see--ing. Leeds Castle, strangely enough, is nowhere near Leeds but is situated very handy to London, near Maidstone in Kent. It is one of the oldest of England's stately homes and was first built in the reign on William the Conqueror's son, Henry I, by a Norman Baron nearly nine hundred years ago. It came into the possession of the Royal Family some hundred and fifty years later on the accession of Edward I. It became the Royal home of Edward I and his Queen, Eleanor of Castile. This was the Queen who died in the English countryside north of London & on the journey to Westminister Abby where she is buried. Edward had raised at each place the coffin rested a cross in her memory. Some of these crosses, known as Eleanor Crosses, still survive, the final one being the well known Charing Cross in London.

Leeds Castle remained the property of the Royal Family un -til the reign of Henry V111. He was having serious problems in Ireland (has a familiar sound) and after Sir Anthony St. Ledger rendered great service to the Crown there, he was rewar ded by being granted ownership of Leeds Castle. After three hundred years of Royal ownership, during which it was part of the very history of England seeing the birth of the Tudor Dyn

-asty itself, it passed out of Royal ownership.

The Castle passed through the hands of various great famil--ies until 1926 when it was bought by Lady Ballie, daughter of Almeric Paget, Lord Queensborough, who was a grandson of Field Marshal Henry William Paget, Marquis of Angelsea who commanded the British Cavalry at Waterloo. Lady Baillie completely rest--ored the Castle and she lived there longer than any owner in all its recorded history. On her death the Castle was reque--athed, at her request, to the nation for public benefit in per--petuity. To-day it is open to the public and its great confer -ence room is used for research seminars and recently was the setting for a top conference of nations trying to solve the'

Israel, Egyptian problems.

· That is a brief resume of Leeds Castle historically and now a little bit about the Castle itself. It is built on two small islands on the Len River and the river and lake forms a complete moat, one of the few left in the British Isles. The grounds are extensive and wooded. The sides of the river have been landscaped and have waterfalls to add to their att--raction. It has been called the loveliest castle in the world. I.t will be autumn in England now and this place with trees in autumn tonings would be one of the glories of the world.

Lady Baillie was a bird lover and she brought rare birds from all over the world for the gardens and lakes. The water bird collection has to be seen to be believed, all roaming free and visitors can walk around amongst them. Geese, Chinese Ducks and Geese, and even our familiar Maned
Geese and Chestnut Teal are swimming around as if they had never
known any other place to live. Probably they were born and bred
at Leeds so really did not know any other home.

Lady Baillie was also a parrot lover and had very extensive ranges of parrot breeding aviaries erected. Her collection included many Australian parrots including Princess Alexandras and Scarlet Breasts. She also had commissioned an artist to paint studies of the birds for her and these are hung in the extensive

hallways in the Castle.

There are also many varieties of Pheasants and amongst the smaller birds are Weavers and Whydahs. All in all this Castle is a delight to visit and being such a short beautiful drive from London should be a must for any visitors to England.

Thank you Bill for widening our field of interest. Both you and Zaid e ewman have recently given us food for thought and provided us with a media of international understanding that common interests in the field of nature studies provide for us.

Details for this outing from John, today as are below:-Depart "Weeroona Park " 9am (NOTE TIME) arrive "Mountain Park" gate on the (Old Dalveen -Warwick Road) which goes between the railway and the Dalveen P.O. John has been breaking new ground in these fields(regrettably he adds, that it has not been done long since) John's philosophy is a compromise with grazing and the protection of wild-life and the habitat plus the care of the soil.
