GUEST SPEAKER John Walker opened by thanking the club for changing the meeting night to suit his plans. John and Ruth Walter then took us "From Goyders to Mount Isa in a most picturesque way and this was enlightened by a commentry of interest and humour. Their deep interest in birds was such as to stir enthusiasm in those present. The trip had been arranged specially to view some of the less obser--ved birds to beg seen in the Channel Country and S.W. and west of Queensland, and because of fair seasons the wildflowers sprinkled in between were beautiful and of interest too.

J. Harslett offered a vote of thanks, complimenting them both on good pictures, interesting subject matter much of which most of had little chance of seeing, and a good commentary jointly given. Members well supported her.

Millie Marsden has kindly provided us with a report on the Carp-out. Thank-you. CAMP-OUT AND HIKE by MILLIE MARSDEN.

The Walk-out Camp-out held in November proved to be a most interesting item on the calendar of the Stanthorpe Field Naturalists Club. Intending walkers brought their overnight gear and requisits to the starting point at the Stanthorpe High School. From here the camping items were loaded into the trailerand taken by our son to the camp site to await the arrival of the walkers.. At noon eleven walkers headed off into the undergrowth, across the paddock and up to Mount Banca. The lunch stop was to be the large rock outcrop on the south-eastern side with a splendid view overlooking the town. In reverse towns-folk sometimes see young people practising their absailling from this outcrop. Thus it was a splendid grandstand view of the town nestling below in a sea of gold provided by the abundant flowering of corriopsis. The lunch stop took longer than expected, a cicade chose to display the miracle of emerging from its fearsome looking cocoon to a winged looking 'princess'. John had a puzzle for us, "Find the Bird in the Tree' eventually it materalised to everyone, a frogmouth superbly camouflaged. Speaking of defensive camouflage, Rene Thompson was heard to say, "snake" but a slightly less hasty decision proved it to be a lizard, Burton's Legless'S' oops nearly typed snake instead of lizard, so remarkable was its likeness. This lizard on small skinks so one could not quite call it a can mibal, perhapes some of our readers can supply the correct word for this habit. In the daytime they frequent--ly rest in young bushy gum saplings. This one chose to nestle amongst some dropped and browned gum leaves the colouring of which exactly matched its pinkish-brown colouring. Its very pointed snout-like head is a give away to its identity, and there are very few who are not 'fooled' by it at first siting, others are reluctant to believe you anyway!! that its not 'snake'.

After lunch we were urged on across Happy Valley with its wonderful little stream of crystal clear water, and colony of little birds and then up on to Flower Garden Rock". This really un-named, rock faces the south with good views of the surrounding country along with masses of flowers amongst the most prevalent were Boronia Flannel Flowers, Baekea, Eriostemonand and numerous other

gay little chaps.

We pressed on into the scrub, up hill and down hill seeing many flowers, birds and rock formations, and came out of the thick area to transverse Mr.Doug Walkers property & then into thick undergrowth again, Hibbertias, Bernia and Zieria seen, then on to eastern flat of the Little Broadwater where an old sawmill was positioned in early times. The valley was almost parklike and mown to walk along.

We were delighted to find a fine stand of the very pale mauve Callistemon(the un-named Happy Valley one) and incre--asing its range. Two hundred yards further on was a lemon Callistemon (C.pallidus) A leatherhead's swinging nest was inspected, bird sitting, and as afternoon was drawing on we were pleased to reach the campsite. Frank. W. being first to arrive thoughtfully had fires stoked. Visiters Mr. &Mrs. Leo Butler & family & the Walker family were already in reside -ence.Our camp-oven meal was smartly put on, while we waite -ed a pizza entreé, cooked in the camp oven was served. (It would for sheer delicousness knock one of Mamma Luigi's best into a cock hat. Ed.) Then the youngsters nad a go at making a damper and it was a joyous success. Twenty-one were at the campfire and 9 camped overnight, & were up bright & early to try & beat the flies, but lost!! The flies were very bad, but life was 'nt meant - - -. After breakfast all helped to break camp and load goods into the trailer to be picked up later by our helpers (silent) & delivered back to base one.

We left camp on the appointed time of 8am., crossed the creek to a flat rock, with unusal shaped rock pools and 'gardens' of vivid penetrating blue of Stypandra grandis, oh! so well named and mint bush. A truely delightful interlude, of interesting shapes (& positions of photographers) bent on getting the best picture. I understand John O'Donnell had a 45 bird list for the outing.

Morning-tea was served from an elusive spring high on the side hillside. Its sight although known to oldtimers eluded us on the pre-outing trip and nearly on this one too, Ray and Tom perservering until it was located. Billytea was very acceptable and we also had the privelege of watching a black snake at close quarters, searching for food in the swamp, completely unaware of our presence until two camera shutters clicked, he was off like a shot.

Weather began to detoriate, with one or two showers, light, before lunch at a rock on the Allen property at Applethorpe where we investigated a deep round rock hole, on a flat rock Full of water its said never to overflow or dry up. During droughts it has been the only water about and stock have survived because of it. We marvelled also at the remains of a garden nearby, & the chimney of the old Bertram home, the garden must have been wonderful in its time, roses were still blooming & an orange tree yielded several sweet easily peel -ed oranges. After lunch our thoughts were for home before our legs dropped off! We headed south down through the late George Sim's property where we looked at a Queensland Nut tree planted by him many years ago, in a sheltered place It has reached the statue of 30 feet, I mean 10 metres, & is Known to fruit quite well some years. We headed along the valley of Funker's Gap Creek quite rugged on the top end and were pleased to find a well worn little track, the easi -est way of descent also worn by the late Mr. Sims enroute to town. Along at the back of the Experimental Station and in-

-to Mr.Tom Spiller's property, down to the Caves area and back to the starting place. In a thicket on Spillers place we had a fine look at a Nankeen Night Heron (The name of 'nankeen' comes from the colour of Nankeen Cotton' which used to be imported from China, and describes the solour, of back of the bird. We arrived back at 2.50pm and quite a big storm broke at 3pm., so the timing was perfect. Sure we were leg weary, but we enjoyed the experience and the company & the knowlege that so much can be seen within a radius of 6 or 7 kms. of Stanthorpe, with numerous deviations , of course. Thanks are extended to all landholders who allowed us to cross their properties & the Butlers for the campsite. Millie Marsden.
