Up in a nearby Tree was a very very hostile Wattle Bird but all its raucus noise didn't deter the Parrot who quietly continued drinking - the bubbles in the bottle proved this to be so. No wonder the bottles of nectar didn't last as long as they usually did - and I wonder how many other parrots had enjoyed a drink too!!

MAY OUTING REPORT by Leader, Don Lightfoot

The May outing of the club was held on Sunday May 22nd and members were joined by the Stanthorpe Historical Society for an outing to Pikedale under the leadership of Don Lightfoot. Cars met at Weeroona Park at 9 a.m. and members were given a brief outline of the days pro-Cars travelled via Texas Road to the Pikedale Stockyards where morning tea was enjoyed and a headcount showed 34 people were present. The party then had a look around various old sheds and the remains of the old Pikedale Homestead. Some history of this Station was given from when it was first taken up and about the past owners up to the present time. Also about the sheds and how they were used in the past - in particular the old Blacksmith shop - the country being traprock it was very necessary for horses to be shod otherwise they were of no use, -- Old Stables with Iron Bark blocks for the floor in the ground about 2 feet; harness and machinery sheds etc. Another very interesting story was the starting method of a Field Manchell diesel tractor (one cylinder) which was once used on the property. Pikedale Homestead was a landmark for many years. It stood on three acres of landscaped gardens with tennis courts where social games were played. The gardens were once a show place - a credit to the owners There still is a stone fence standing today and gardeners alike. built possibly 100 years ago. The homestead was demtroyed by fire

The party next travelled via Inglewood Road turning off through some paddocks of rolling hills and then down to the Washpool on Pikes Creek where lunch was enjoyed. A brief history of the working of the Washpool was given. The purpose of the Washpool was to wash hot the sheep in full wool before shearing. The sheep were forced into yards and races into the water where the washing took place by hand. When this process was finished, the sheep were let go into a ½ mile lane (in those days was called a pony fence). The sheep would not be herded until wanted in the shearing shed and the fence went right into the old shearing shed about 2½ miles away.

The reason the Historical Society members joined the outing was not only for historical information re the Homestead and property but to also put a new fence around an old grave on the bank of the creek. It is not definite but is thought to be the grave of a man named Stoddard who died in 1878. While the refencing took place some Nats members enjoyed a walk and saw some interesting bird life. A wegetail eagle was senn also tree creepers, blue wrens, King parrots and a couple of finches.

May Outing continues -

All members joined together back at the Inglewood Road for Afternoon tea and an enjoyable day came to a close as cars wended their way home at 4 p.m.

Many thanks to Don for a very interesting historic outing. Ed.
