



Outing Report

September 1988

Lyra area.

Leader

Brian McDonagh.

A total of 16 people took part in the outing on September25 to the Lyra area.

The morning walk was to a small wildflower area north of Doctors Creek, which had a large number of species of flowers, but no massive shows as we saw the previous month at Amiens. An outing was held to the same area about ten years ago, when the display was much better. There has not been a fire through the area since about 1956, and a number of species, particularly Eriostemon myoporcides seem to have reached the end of their lives. The numbers were there and the tree-pea, Oxylobium arboretum and Kunzea did make a bright display.

#### September outing.(con't'd)

Lunch was held back at the cars, when a couple of members left and we were joined by Peter Rodger and son whose family own the property of the afternoon walk. Millie also joined us at this time. We were pleased that, once again, Jean brought along an agricultural exchangee and we made Knud Jespersen very welcome.

Doctors Creek forms a spectacular gorge as it drops from the Eukey tableland. We walked along the northern side of the gorge at a botanists pace (one mile in X number of hours) pausing to examine and photograph. The first official spell was in an area with a spectacular display of Boronia amabilis( probably the best of the local boronias, or from anywhere else for that matter) set off by Wyberba wattle, Acacia pulicfolia. At this point one could look down into the gorge with its rainforest creepers and other odd plants which are rather rare on the Granite Belt.

After about half a mile of easier walking, still with a good selection of flowers, we reached the area of the falls, where the going was very rough. At the falls one finds a different selection of wildflowers. Very beautiful on this day was the Leucopogon biflorus, which may well be the pick of the heath family. Also in this area was Hakea propinqua with its tiny flowers but massive nobbly seedpods. Some staghorns were seen.

Finally we fought our way back to the top of the falls, and the first member was climbing down to get a look at them when the thunder started. Nobody really saw the falls, as a vote was taken to return quickly to the cars. In the 20 minutes taken to return to

the cars, we didn't get really wet, but very damp.

The day was really a ground orchid day, almost everywhere the wax-lipped orchid Glossodia major was making a show; three species of Caladenia; four species of greenhoods, fourteen species in all. Orchid list: Caladenia dilatata - Spider orchid

Caladenia carrea - Pinkie

Caladenia alba - Larger than the Pinkie and white

Diuris aurea \$ Double tailed Donkey ears

Dendrobium linguiforme - Tongue orchid

Glossodia major - Purple Waxlip Glossodia Major - the rare white

- the rare white form of above

- Red Parrot beak.

Pterostylis nutans - Parrot greenhood Pterostylis mutica - Small greenhood Acianthus exsertus - Gnat orchid

Acianthus reniformis- Mosquito orchid

Calochilys robertsoni - Bearded orchid(buds only)

Pterostylis rufa - Red hooded

Jean Harslett and I visited the mosquito orchids Acianthus reniformis a week later and found a few extra species also in taht area.

## Historical Aspects of the Lyra.Outing.

In 1824 Cunningham brought his team of jaded men and exhausted packhorses down the valley. If the vegetation was as it is now, he would have had to cut a track through.

After camping overnight somewhere in the valley, he climbed the bluff and saw open country to the west, and, from the tone of his diary, heaved a sigh of releif. The range to the north, the edge of the Eukey plateau, he called a "formidable range".

This information came from research carried out by the late

Mervyn Fletcher.

Another part of interest is that, for many years an illicit still was operated in the gorge, producing fire water for the men building the railway line through to Wallangarra. A member of the family found a smoke-blackened rock and a small pile of bottles many years later. On going back to the area some 20 years later no trace could be found of the spot.

The bluff to the south was a training ground for the Queensland University Rock Climbing Club, lead by Fred Fromm, who lost his

life on Mt. Everst a couple of years ago.
