# Brookvale Park and Jondaryan Wool Shed

Six carloads of Stanthorpe Nats members headed for Bookvale Park and the Jondaryan Woolshed on August 27th to join the celebrations connected with the Australian Heritage. It was a beautiful day which enabled all to enjoy to the fullest the many offerings presented at this Festival. The flora and fauna presented a picturesque sight and in the special marquis was a wonderful collection of wild flowers from all over Australia - Tasmania to Cooktown and it was really an eye-opener to see so many beautiful specimens in one spot. Our thanks to Dore McCosker and her family for a good display of wild flowers from this area which they collected and delivered to the park for us.

After lunch we went on to the Jondaryan Woolshed where we saw a Bullock Team; rope making; Ye Olde Blacksmith Shop; fence post making and quite a display of shearing — one demonstration using hand shears; then the modern way and last but by no means least a sheep was shorn with the operator blindfolded. Many old time engines and tractors where on display — most working and some taking folk on joy rides. A delicious afternoon tea consisting of Damper, Syrup and Billy tea cooked the old fashioned way in a camp oven in hot ashes completed the day.

#### PreOuting notes on Texas Outing from Lawrie Jeffrey

Lawrie writes - "It will be my pleasure to act as guide for your Club's visit to this area on Sunday 24th September.

Perhaps it would be helpful if I gave you an outline of the route to be taken. We will head south from Texas through the Atholwood district to the McIntyre River, up stream from the part that we visited last year. The return trip to Texas will be about 50 miles, over roads that are almost entirely unsealed, but in reasonable condition.

As you will most likely travel to Texas via Glen Lyon, may I bring to your notice a few items of interest that can be observed from the car.

About four miles from Glen Lyon turn off, whilst travelling down hill from the highest part of the road, toward the Shire Boundary, the buildings at Glen Lyon Dam are visible (the Lake itself is very prominent from not far off the road, on private property, as is the Passchendaele T.V. Mast.)

Immediately upon entering the Inglewood Shire, the mountain on the right, around whose base the road circles, is Cox's Sugarloaf (1800 feet above sea level), and in front, further along the road, a pyramidal shaped mountain, situated north of Silver Spur, is Mt. Hunyan (2,000 feet above sea level). This is the highest mountain in the Texas area.

Regarding the time of assembly at the Texas Post Office, any time is suitable to us. However, as we have a fairly long day ahead of us, as early a start as possible would be advisable.

( N.B.- at our Nats Meeting Aug. 30th, meeting time at Texas Post Office was 9.30 a.m.)

Last Tuesday was no different - they greeted me in the usual way. However, as we watched them from the window they suddenly became very aggressive especially to the Green Cat Birds who had arrived on the scene. There were more Cat Birds than usual this time and the two wattle birds chased them resulting in quite a colourful and spectacular display of flying so speedy one would have needed a movie Camera to get it on film.

This morning my friendly Wattle birds were there at breakfast time plus the normal number of other birds — — it looks as though the visting Cat Birds of Tuesday got the message that they were not welcome and peace reigned supreme.
