The Harp of the South

The book was written as an entry in a competition run by the Sydney Morning Herald.

It is a book about the Darcys, descendants of immigrant Irish Catholics, and set in the slums of Surry Hills in the late 1940s. The family of 4, father Hughie, mother Margaret (a.k.a. Mumma) and 2 daughters, Roie and Dolour, live amid great poverty. There are rats, and the ever present bed bugs. Outside toilets, no bathroom, and everyone crammed into a few rooms. When Margaret's mother came to live there is no spare bed.

When it won the prize, the

book received mixed reviews. Many loved it. Others hated it, and doubted its authenticity. But Ruth Park, and her husband, Darcy Niland, were poor newly-weds, and housing was desperately short in Sydney at the time, and they lived in such a tenement as described in the book. Ruth Park knew what she was writing about.

The Darcys had nothing. We found it difficult to believe that life was so hard in Sydney, immediately after the end of WW11. The poverty was a point of animated discussion in our group. Our group are of an age when we had poor childhoods, money-wise, but nothing as

desperate as the Darcys, and their neighbours. But there was a great sense of loyalty and community among the slum dwellers.

We agreed that it was an excellent book, and were glad that we read it.
